## Ride, Watch or Volunteer — By Mimi Bliss

CTDA's summer dressage shows are a great way to get involved in your local dressage community.

You can ride, watch or volunteer at schooling shows and shows recognized by the United States Dressage Federation (USDF).

The June Classic is a new event at Old Hillsboro Manor in Franklin. CTDA is testing the one-day format for a USDF-recognized show.

Schooling shows are a low-key, affordable show opportunity, whether you're an amateur, professional, junior or child. Moon Shadows Farm in Dickson hosts a schooling show on July 21 and Walnut Trace Farm in Nashville is the site of the August 11 show.

Western dressage is gaining popularity nationwide and recently made the cover of *USDF Connection*, the official publication of the United States Dressage Federation. Western dressage classes were included at CTDA's schooling show at Double H Farm in Chapel Hill on May 5 (competitors included CTDA member Anna Whitworth) and will be offered at CTDA schooling shows throughout the year.

"When dressage suits your needs but a Stetson fits your lifestyle" is the motto of one of the founders of the Western Dressage Association of America (WDAA). WDAA was founded by Eatin Beth-Halachmy, Jack Brainard and others in 2010. Eitan rode in the closing ceremony at the 2006 World Equestrian Games in Aachen, Germany.

## Western Dressage, continued — By Jenni Hogan

Despite his western apparel and stock saddle and tack, his performance brought the knowledgeable, mostly European audience to their feet in an enthusiastic standing ovation. He again performed a Western dressage demonstration at the WEG in Kentucky in 2010.

The American Morgan Horse Association (AMHA) recognized the need for classical training to cross the gap between Western and English disciplines. AMHA, along with the United States Equestrian Federation (USEF), created Western dressage tests. These tests are available at usef.org. The basic test (1 and 2) is comparable to the United States Dressage Federation's introductory level.

The primary tests (1-4) are comparable to USEF's training level

tests. The WDAA website recommends that Western dressage riders seek advice and training from reputable dressage judges. In order to judge a Western dressage class, it is required that the judge is a USEF-recognized judge.

WDAA rules are simple. They refer to USEF DR division rules in the rulebook with the exceptions being the description of the gaits and acceptable tack and equipment. The horses are to be ridden on the bit with light, steady contact. Riders are permitted to ride in a snaffle or curb. Riders who choose to ride in a curb may do so using one or both reins.

Jack Brainard says "There is no reason why our Western horses can't do the piaffe, half-pass, pirouettes, tempe lead changes and do sliding stops and spins as well. These things can happen and our horses will be far better doing anything we ask."

## State Champs

Check your scores to see if you qualify for the Tennessee State Dressage Championship in late August. Championship classes will be held in conjunction with the Ole South Dressage shows on August 24-26 at Miller Coliseum in Murfreesboro, Tenn. The Championship is being moved-up from October to avoid schedule conflicts with regional finals.

You may qualify for championship classes with scores earned in either 2011 or 2012. 2011 scores are grandfathered because the event was cancelled last year. Members of any USDF GMO (Group Membership Organization) in

Tennessee are eligible to compete in championship classes if they are members at the time their qualifying scores were earned. Details at tndressage.com.



#### **USDF Rider Awards: It's Never Too Late** — By Mimi Bliss

It's never too late to reach your goal to earn a United States Dressage Federation Bronze Medal, says CTDA member Penny Lindsley.

A few months shy of her 69th birthday, Penny earned her final qualifying score for her Bronze Medal at CTDA's Tennessean dressage shows in April. The Bronze Medal requires two scores of at least 60% at First, Second and Third Levels, for a total of six qualifying scores (visit usdf.org for details about USDF Rider Awards at all levels).

"My goal was to earn my Bronze
Medal before I turned 70," said
Penny. "I thought I would stop with
my Bronze, but now I want to keep going!!"

Like many amateur adult riders, Penny started riding when she was young. As an adult, she rode onand-off for many years, taking breaks for marriage, children and work.

Penny began her "real quest to learn dressage" when she was in her fifties. She eventually bought a young dressage prospect and described her early years of dressage with a green horse as "torture."

Penny says she was fortunate to find the "perfect horse" in 2010 – Alpenkoenig, a seventeen-year-old Hanovarian schoolmaster who was owned and shown by CTDA member Anne Echerd. Penny jumped right into showing Alfie, moving through First, Second and Third Levels.

"I had to make a commitment," said Penny. "I had to go to shows and get past the difficulties of going down centerline over and over again."

Penny's commitment to training is impressive. She takes five lessons each week with CTDA member and trainer Garra Walline.

"I will wear threadbare breeches so I can spend the money on lessons," said Penny. "I can't say enough about Garra and what she's done for me."

Alfie is now twenty years old, so Penny doesn't know whether the pair will move to Fourth Level. If not, she wants to pursue higher scores at Third Level, while enjoying Alfie and her other horses at her farm in Franklin.

"I want to ride with grace and ease, refine my skills...and just ride well," said Penny.

## Ring Steward: In the Middle of the Show — By Mimi Bliss

When you volunteer as a ring steward at a dressage show, your job is to make sure that competitors enter the show ring at the right time and in the correct order.

"You're right there in the middle of it," said Susan Anderson, a CTDA member, competitor and ring steward volunteer. "You get to meet new people and watch your friends show."

Anderson says ring steward is her favorite role when she's not showing herself. Susan has a seven-year-old mare, Fellina, a Thoroughbred/Oldenburg cross who is boarded at Old Hillsboro Manor.

Added Susan, "It's fun to see people I haven't seen in a while. I can see how they're progressing."

Volunteering at shows is a great way to expand your knowledge of dressage, said CTDA member Nancy Whitman, who lives on a farm in Castalian Springs, which is north of Nashville. She has an eighteen-year-old Dutch warmblood gelding, two-year-old Rheinlander gelding and 28-inch tall miniature horse named "Hot Shot."

"There's so much to learn in watching others," said Nancy. "You can truly see that your faults are the same ones that other riders have at every level — tenseness, above the bit, not bending, etc."

"At the Tennessean shows in April, I had the opportunity to watch riders at all levels, including Young Riders from out-of-state, do their warm-up," said Nancy.

Nancy says that competitors depend on the ring steward to provide a five-minute and on-deck warning, as well as keep track of the schedule and official show time. She says the ring steward position can be hectic at large shows, but the job becomes easier with experience.

"The more you volunteer in this position, the easier it is to multi-task," said Nancy.

Schooling shows provide an excellent opportunity to learn the job of ring steward in a relaxed atmosphere with a single show ring.

## **Volunteer as a Ring Steward** — By Beth Huff

**Duties:** The ring steward is responsible for making sure that each rider enters the competition arena in the correct order of go and at the correct time.

The ring steward should have a current schedule of ride times, a watch set to official show time, and a walkie-talkie to communicate with the show office. At a recognized show, the ring steward needs a list of legal equipment, latex gloves to check bits, and either a whip measuring tool or tape measure.

At recognized shows only, the technical delegate will direct the ring steward to check equipment such as bits and dressage whips for adherence to the rules. The technical delegate will train the ring steward to do equipment checks and is available to respond to questions or concerns.

The ring steward should watch over the warm-up area and inform competitors of the order of competition. It is NOT the responsibility of the ring steward to search for the next rider. The ring steward notifies judge/scribe and announcer of scratched or added rides, which are provided by show office.

#### Tips for Ring Stewards:

- \* As competitors approach the show ring, check-off their names on the schedule.
- \* At any given time, there should be only one rider in the show ring, one waiting to enter ("on-deck") and the next one "in the hole."
- \* Due to liability exposure, the ring steward should not adjust a competitor's tack.
- \* After the rider in the show ring has finished his/her final salute, the next rider may warm-up around or inside the ring, depending on the set-up of the ring.

Being a ring steward is a fun way to be part of the competition! You have the opportunity to watch horses and riders in the warm-up ring. CTDA needs ring stewards at both recognized and schooling shows and can easily train family members to help (see show dates on back page).

To volunteer as a ring steward or other position such as scorer, gatekeeper or runner (great job for young people and children!), **contact Beth Huff at bethchuff@gmail.com or 615-477-8289.** Beth can also tell you about CTDA's Learner Scribe Program, which prepares volunteers to serve as scribes at our shows. Remember, you'll need to work five volunteer hours or secure \$60 in sponsorships to be eligible for CTDA Year-End Awards. We hope to see you at the next show!




